


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

EVERY YEAR the needs and concerns of cancer patients and their families change. And so it is important that we respond to these changing needs also. At our last strategic review, the scale and scope of support services was reviewed. There were several key decisions taken to address the changing needs of our population. Most importantly, a decision was taken to expand our services to one of our furthest outreach areas and that is in Letterkenny in north Co. Donegal. When we reviewed support services in Co. Donegal, it appeared that there was a significant gap in these services. On approaching Letterkenny General Hospital, there was a very enthusiastic and positive response for such an expansion.

On March 1st 2017, the Donegal Cancer Support centre, based at Pearse Street, Letterkenny will open. It will initially be staffed by a senior clinical psychologist and two oncology nurse support specialists (job-sharing post) who will provide a service modelled on the one in Galway. Cancer Care West will also be providing a Psycho-Oncology service to Letterkenny General Hospital. This is to support patients who are inpatient in hospital and experiencing distress or anxiety due to their diagnosis of cancer.

We plan to continue to expand our service at University Hospital Galway and the Galway Clinic. In addition we will explore the possibility of providing a similar service to other satellite cancer centres in our region.

Another initiative we would like to develop is the provision of a remote counselling service through the use of Skype or similar technology. Due to the nature of our region, we have increasingly found that many of the people who use our service find it difficult to travel to Galway for psychological support. We believe that this will be of great benefit to our clients.

We also plan to offer an extended support service for children affected by cancer through liaising with schools and other services. Our overarching aim is to grow our model of community Psycho-Oncology so that it best meets the needs of the people who use our services.

Welcome to Cancer Care West's 2016 Annual Report. In the last year, Cancer Care West provided support to more patients and families than ever before in our history. We continued to deliver a wide range of cancer services to patients and their families and the demand for these services has continued to grow year on year. In total we provided support to 2,637 people during 2016 from all over the West and North West of Ireland.

Inis Aoibhinn, our residential facility, will celebrate its 10th anniversary early next year. We are all very proud of what has been achieved since Inis Aoibhinn opened its doors in 2007. Since then it has accommodated over 4,000 patients and family members who would otherwise have had to travel long distances every day to their treatment. Our Cancer Support Centre in Galway continues to go from strength to strength with almost 1,500 people using the centre in 2016. The demand for the counselling service we provide to inpatients at University Hospital Galway from this centre continues to increase, with 233 patients receiving this service during 2016. Given the scale of the increase over the last number of years for this service, we have plans to appoint a full time Psychologist to this post early in 2017. We also provided support to 70 families through our Patient and Family Support Programme.

Our vision that no one should go through their cancer alone, provides the driving force behind everything we do. We realise that the number of people that will need our range of practical and emotional supports will continue to increase into the future and we must be prepared to meet this need. Our new Cancer Support Centre in Letterkenny which is due to open in March of next year is an example of this strategy. This will be our first service located outside of Galway and we are very excited to provide this essential service to the people of Donegal. This hopefully will be the first in a range of initiatives to grow our services over the next number of years.

Of course we would not be in a position to maintain and grow our services without the help and assistance of all our supporters and partners. The incredible support we receive from our Donors who share our vision and acknowledge our work continues to humble us. Once again we say a big THANK YOU from us and from all who benefited from your kindness and generosity. To all our staff and volunteers, our success and achievements outlined in this report are due to your dedication and compassion. We are also very grateful to our board who freely donate their time, skill and expertise to the work of Cancer Care West. We would also like to acknowledge the continued support of the staff and management of University Hospital Galway, with whom we work closely to ensure as many people as possible have access to our services.

This report very clearly highlights the impact of our work and the real difference our charity makes in people's lives. We are passionate about improving the lives of the cancer patients and families we serve and are committed to continuing to provide support to those who most need it.

We are very grateful for your help and look forward to your continuing support in the years ahead.

Cancer Support Centre has continued to provide a unique community based model of psychological and oncology support for cancer patients and their families. Despite the many breakthroughs in cancer treatment, by the year 2020, almost half the population of Ireland will have had cancer at some point in their lives. As cancer affects more people, it is imperative that the model of community Psycho-Oncology support offered by Cancer Care West is available to anyone who needs it. During the year, we have taken several important steps to fulfil this goal, including the development of a new Cancer Support Centre in Donegal to serve the northwest of Ireland, as well as the appointment of a senior psychologist to deliver a psychological support service to inpatients at Letterkenny General Hospital.

We have also developed a dedicated Psycho-Oncology service for University Hospital Galway. This means that cancer patients and the staff working at the hospital have access to a clinical psychologist experienced in supporting people with cancer on a daily basis. Dr Norma Jean Murphy, Clinical Psychologist has been appointed to lead this service. This has led to a vastly improved service with significantly more contact with patients. We now attend all multi-disciplinary meetings weekly in the hospital. We have also expanded our service at the Galway Clinic, now offering seven hours per week intervention to both patients and staff.

Our other big development this year has been the expansion of our children's service with children aged 3 to 18 years being seen for individual therapy. An additional aspect of this service is psycho-education for parents who sometimes struggle to either tell their children what is happening in the family or know how to manage issues around the terminal phase of their illness.

During 2016, the centre was visited 7,182 times by over 1,300 people affected by cancer. Most of the people who used the centre availed of individual services, including psychology, oncology information, benefits advice and complementary therapy.

We continue to support people at all stages of their illness and unfortunately some of the people who used our service sadly died from their illness during the year.

In 2016, 847 people visited the centre for the first time. This represents a 16% annual increase in the number of people using the service for the first time. This reflects a growing awareness of the range of services available and is probably also a reflection of the increasing use of social media.

Our support centre is based in the community, beside the main treating hospital in the West of Ireland where there are a wide range of services available at no cost to the patient or their family. Similarly, in Letterkenny our service will serve both the community and the hospital. This service will be modelled on our very successful centre in Galway.

May I take this opportunity to thank all the people who use our support services. It is our privilege to offer support, warmth and professional services to anyone affected by cancer. Without your presence, our centre would not be the vibrant place that it has become. I want to sincerely thank the staff, volunteers and cancer support specialists who support the centre in its work.

From the moment Larrived at the Cancer Support Centre I felt welcome. I talked to Elaine, one of the Oncology nurses, and realized that it was the first time since my diagnosis that I didn't feel alone. I am generally a resilient, positive person, but cancer can be a very isolating illness and there were days when I didn't feel strong. I arranged a series of counselling sessions with Helen, one of the Psychologists. Helen treated me as a person and not just as a patient, and helped me to put things in perspective and to realise that it was OK to have days when I felt down. She helped me to find a way to talk with my teenage son about what was happening with my illness and treatment.

I used many of the services at the Cancer Support Centre, all free of charge: yoga and tai chi classes, reflexology and nutrition, and massage therapies which I found really helpful, physically and emotionally. I have been living on illness benefit since I became sick and I simply wouldn't have had access to any of these support services if I had to pay for them myself.

I haven't found cancer treatment difficult and fortunately have had no side effects; however I really don't think I would be feeling as good as I am without the emotional support of Cancer Care West. I think everyone who experiences cancer needs some support and for me it was the safe haven of Cancer Care West's Cancer Support Centre.

Volunteer Focus

Cancer Support Centre Volunteer

Having been brought up around a county
Galway family business and worked there all
my life, talking to people has been something
I've been used to doing for as long as I
can remember. I had been thinking about
volunteering before I retired and I discussed
possible opportunities with a friend who works
as a hospice nurse in Dublin. She suggested
contacting Cancer Care West to see if any
volunteers were needed in their newly opened
Cancer Support Centre and so I met with
Helen, the director of the centre. The timing
was right, and in May 2010 I started my
volunteering life with Cancer Care West.

My role is what you would describe as meet and greet, and I know from talking to people who come here just how difficult it can be to get through the door for the first time, so I try to be as friendly and welcoming as possible. I offer a cup of tea or coffee, have a chat and introduce the visitor to one of our oncology nurses. Our clients often tell me that the first thing they notice when they walk in is the lovely fireplace and huge colourful paintings, and that they immediately find the centre a cheerful place to be even if they are feeling down. A lot of the time clients are looking for specific information or have an appointment, but often people are not sure what they are looking for or how the centre might be of help to them.

I volunteer on Tuesday which is a particularly busy day at the centre. We have people using our drop in service, coming for individual treatments and consultations, and taking part in the exercise class. Some of the people taking the class are still going through treatment, but most are recovering or recovered. After the class they have tea and a good laugh with each other and people often tell us that they get as much support from each other as they do from the individual class or therapy itself.

I would love to see more men using the services in the centre. I know that women often chat to each other more easily than men do, but there are so many services on offer here, all completely free, and I think it could be such a great support to men if they would come and try them out.

7 years after I started volunteering at the Cancer Support Centre I'm still here. As a volunteer I am made to feel an important part of the team and I thoroughly enjoy the camaraderie that exists between clients, staff and volunteers which I feel has an uplifting effect on everyone who comes here. Volunteering gives structure to my week as my only other commitments are to visit my grandkids and do some babysitting, and I hope to be volunteering here long into the future.

Cancer Support Centre Oncology Nurse

There is no such thing as a typical day at Cancer Care West – after 10 years working here I don't think two days have even been similar! After I qualified as a nurse I worked in hospitals in Australia and Dublin, and closer to home in Castlebar and Galway, and then joined Inis Aoibhinn when it opened in 2007. I felt that working at Inis Aoibhinn would provide a great opportunity to work with west of Ireland cancer patients during a time of significant developments in the availability of cancer treatment in Galway. I worked at Inis Aoibhinn for 2 years before joining the team at the Cancer Support Centre when it opened in Westside in 2009.

The Cancer Support Centre is modelled on the Maggie's centres in the UK and was the first support centre of its kind in Ireland. It was fantastic to be part of the startup team providing practical and psychological support services to cancer patients and their families, identifying the types of services that people wanted and to see which services were working particularly well.

My role is very diverse and ranges from organizing our many support groups, courses and information evenings, to spending time meeting clients on a one to one basis. One of the greatest things about working here is having time to spend with people, we are able to take the time to have an in depth conversation if that is what the client wants. It is a huge privilege to listen to people's concerns and to do what I can to make a difference in their lives. We work very much as a team at the Cancer Support Centre and are fortunate that we are able to refer people to a range of supports that they might need. If I meet someone who is very stressed by a cancer experience and feel that they might need some ongoing psychological support I can refer them to one of our Psychologists.

Uncertainty about the future, worrying about children and financial stress can be huge issues for patients and family members alike. Cancer affects the whole family, not just the person who is going through treatment. The medical system is patient focused, which is how it should be, however it can be difficult for medical professionals to find the time to talk with patients and family members. At the Cancer Support Centre we see the impact of cancer on the whole family, and in some cases it is the family members who are more affected and need to have someone to talk to as they may not have received any support outside the family themselves.

We have recently introduced services to support children affected by cancer and their parents and I work with children taking our CLIMB programme. It is wonderful to see the children learning, through art and games, about how to talk about their experiences and feelings.

Early next year we will celebrate 10 years since the opening of Inis Aoibhinn and we are very proud of what we have achieved in supporting so many oncology patients and their families during this time. Each one of us at Inis Aoibhinn feel privileged to support patients and their family members during part of their cancer journey.

Amid all the seriousness that is cancer there is a lot of positivity and fun at Inis Aoibhinn. We have had a number of wonderful evening's entertainment provided by the Celtic Ramblers, Michael Kelly and the Newport/Westport set dancers, BEO and also Fergus Cleary and Johnny Haughey from Donegal. We are very grateful to all of them for taking the time to visit us. Cepta Casserly holds a wonderful card making class on Tuesdays which is enjoyed by all who attend, and for which we are very grateful.

I would like to thank the residents and staff that took part in the documentary Turas na hAilse which was produced by Phantom Limb Productions and will air on TG4 in April next year. The documentary highlights the difficulties people face when travelling long distances to avail of their radiotherapy treatment in Galway.

We were very pleased to be able to help 32 families under our Patient and Family Support Programme with accommodation assistance. We know that it means so much to these families to have one less thing to worry about when they are going through such a difficult time.

I would sincerely like to thank each and every one of our staff and volunteers for always being so professional, committed and supportive to our residents, their families and to the charity as a whole. They help to provide such a welcoming atmosphere which can be felt throughout Inis Aoibhinn. As one of our former residents said, "The building is beautiful but the staff make it the special place that it is."



Inis Aoibhinn Residents County of Origin 2016







Philip's Story

It was minus 4 degrees outside on the morning of my wife Mary's first Radiotherapy treatment. We got up at 5am to be on time for Mary's 9am appointment and to allow for the 2.5 hour trip from Ballina to Galway. When Mary was first diagnosed at Mayo General Hospital we thought that we would travel to Galway every day, but after speaking to others from Mayo who had Radiotherapy treatment in Galway we asked to stay at Inis Aoibhinn. Inis Aoibhinn is an amazing place, I cannot praise it enough. You can do your own thing and know that the nurses are there for you if you need them. The food is fantastic and the staff are amazing - you wouldn't find a hotel as good as this! Everyone staying here is in a similar position and there is always someone to talk to. It is wonderful that I have been able to stay at Inis Aoibhinn with Mary during her treatment, and for our family at home it has been a huge relief to know that Mary is being so well cared for. We are very grateful to everyone at Cancer Care West for supporting us so well.

Inis Aoibhinn Staff Nurse

I joined the staff of Inis Aoibhinn in 2009, just before our Galway Cancer Support Centre opened. I had been working with the Irish Cancer Society, caring for people and supporting their families in their homes. I was quite familiar with the Inis Aoibhinn building as I had worked on a ward in University Hospital Galway that overlooked the Inis Aoibhinn site during its construction in 2006/2007. I was very interested in the nature of the work done by Cancer Care West, as it was very much community based and quite different from the usual role nurses have, particularly those in hospitals. As soon as I saw the job advertised, I remember thinking that I'd love that kind of experience. Thankfully my interview went well, I got the job, and I haven't looked back in the 8 years that have passed since!

My responsibilities are varied and always interesting. I think my main job as a nurse at Inis Aoibhinn is to ensure that all our Residents are as healthy and happy as possible. It is of the utmost importance to us that our Residents - patients and guests alike - feel comfortable and safe. We make sure we are available to talk at any time, day or night, should anyone feel they want to discuss their treatment or just need someone to listen to their concerns. As well as receiving the care and attention of the staff and volunteers at Inis Aoibhinn, I believe that a lot of the support comes from fellow Residents who are going through similar uncertainties and emotions, and facilitating this support is a vital role for us.

This has been the first job I have ever had where I enjoy showing up for every single shift. Meeting new residents every day is so enjoyable, even though bidding them farewell at the end of their treatment can be tough. Over the weeks they stay with us, we really get to know each other and the goodbyes can be very emotional. When people call back for a visit, sometimes months or even years later, it is wonderful to reconnect and hear that they are doing well. Sometimes it can be forgotten or under emphasized that whole families are affected by a cancer diagnosis, not just the patients themselves. Supporting the family members of our Residents is an essential part of our job and ethos at Cancer Care West and is very rewarding.

I think the future at Cancer Care West is very exciting; as an organization we are always growing and doing our best to respond to the needs of our service users. The most recent developments are our new Cancer Support Centre in Letterkenny which will be opening shortly, and our range of psychological support services for children at our Support Centre in Galway.

Inis Aoibhinn will be open for 10 years early next year, and I feel we have only just started. I'm looking forward to the future for personal reasons also -my wife and I are expecting our first child next July. I don't doubt that 2017 is going to be an exciting and busy year all round!

Inis Aoibhinn Volunteer

I had never been to Inis Aoibhinn before I started volunteering here - I think it is not unusual for people who live in Galway not to have visited Inis Aoibhinn as the majority of people who stay here are from much further away - Donegal, Mayo, Sligo and so on. A friend of mine was volunteering at Inis Aoibhinn and he asked me to give him a hand with the garden. I was working at the time and started volunteering for a few hours a week, but since I retired I have more spare time and now I spend two to three days a week here. A lot of my work is in the garden - cutting the grass, pruning the rose trees, planting shrubs - whatever seasonal gardening jobs need to be done. I also help out with the maintenance of Inis Aoibhinn, painting, decorating and general DIY - at this stage I know what needs to be done so usually just get on and do it!

Every month I organize a music night for the Residents - I arrange for a local band to come to Inis Aoibhinn for an evening, we have music and dancing and I make sandwiches for everyone. The evening really breaks up the week for people who are staying here for six or seven weeks at a time. I know from talking to people the stress that they can be under and just how much it means to them to stay at Inis Aoibhinn and to have the support of the staff and other people who are also staying here. Not having to worry about finding and paying for bed and breakfast accommodation is a huge relief for most people here too.

I've been volunteering at Inis Aoibhinn for 4 years now - and I'll keep doing it for as long as I'm able. I spend time here because I enjoy it - the staff and other volunteers are welcoming and friendly and I love talking to the Residents and guests who are staying here - we often have a great laugh despite their illness. Chatting with people is a big part of what I do - in fact some days I get very little work done as I spend so much time talking!





Support Programme

CANCER CARE WEST also provides practical support for families in the west and northwest of Ireland who are undergoing long term cancer treatment through our Patient and Family Support Programme.

Families can apply to avail of long term accommodation close to University Hospital Galway when a family member is receiving cancer treatment in hospital. Eligible families who don't live in Galway but want to stay close to their loved one will be found local accommodation at no cost to them.

In 2016, thirty two families were supported with a total of 500 nights' accommodation in apartment or bed and breakfast accommodation.

At 47, my husband Kieran was very fit, regularly playing football and running three to four times a week. The first indication there was something wrong was when Kieran noticed that his running times had become slower - 5km took him a minute and a half longer than usual, which is a big difference to a regular runner. He went to his GP for some blood tests, and the results came back fine. Our daughter was making her Confirmation shortly after this, and during the weekend of her Confirmation celebrations Kieran developed a serious pain in his back which left him in agony for the entire weekend. He knew there was something wrong and went back to the GP, who scheduled a scan for the following week.

A couple of days later Kieran went to bed at 11pm, waking a few hours later in unbearable pain. He didn't want to frighten our daughter by getting her up in the middle of the night so he took some paracetamol and decided to wait until morning. At 8am we went to the A&E department at Sligo General Hospital and at 3.30 that afternoon Kieran received a diagnosis of acute leukaemia. Kieran was transferred by ambulance to University Hospital Galway the following day where he was seen by a consultant whose immediate concern was the level of pain that Kieran was in.

The days that followed were a whirlwind of tests, numbness and shock. I had lost my dad earlier in the year, following the death of my mother just 3 years before that, and the news of Kieran's diagnosis was a terrible blow. I think I was in a daze for much of our first days in Galway. The ward sister on Kieran's ward had a talk with me one day, and said that she was concerned about me and asked if I would talk to someone at Cancer Care West. She made an appointment for me to meet with Mairead, one of the Psychologists at the Cancer Support Centre. I started meeting Mairead regularly and it was wonderful to have someone to talk to about everything that was happening to us.

Mairead introduced me to Jill at Inis Aoibhinn, who told me about the support that was on offer for families who needed long term accommodation in Galway.

Jill organized an apartment for us, which was paid for by Cancer Care West, for 3 months while Kieran was receiving treatment at UHG. As soon as my daughter got her summer holidays from school she was able to come and stay with me and the feeling of relief of having somewhere private to stay, without worrying about the cost was indescribable. We had our own space, just minutes from the hospital, and we did our best to make it our own while we were there. My daughter and I bought some duvet covers to make it homely and on a few occasions Kieran was able to leave hospital for a day and could come to the apartment where we were able to enjoy some time together as a family, outside of the hospital environment.

Throughout this time the support of Cancer Care West was invaluable. I continued to see Mairead at the Cancer Support Centre; Helen – one of the other Psychologists went to see Kieran at the hospital so that he would have someone to talk to outside the family, and Jill would regularly phone me to see how we were getting on.

In October Kieran went to Dublin for a transplant, which was a worrying and stressful time for us all. I couldn't fault the medical treatment that Kieran received in Dublin, but we missed seeing the staff at Cancer Care West. We are back home in Sligo now, and I'm due to return to work soon. We wanted to do something to say thank you to Cancer Care West for all the support we received and so a group of Kieran's family and work colleagues took part in the Warrior run in Sligo. We raised €13,000 for Cancer Care West which I hope can help other families who are in need of the care and support that we received from Cancer Care West.

During the year we held a number of public and training events which enhance our services.

SOME OF THESE ARE ITEMIZED BELOW:

- Our annual conference was held in February. Approximately 60 people attended. The theme of the conference was 'Living Well after Cancer'. The keynote address was given by Mr Jim Fahy, retired Western Correspondent, RTÉ who shared his experience of cancer. There were a number of workshops given by Cancer Care West staff and also Ms Marie Murphy, Exercise and Nutrition Specialist. Feedback from the participants was very positive.
- There were sixteen medical and allied health professionals who attended our annual Psycho-Oncology training. This continues to be one of our most important interactions with Saolta staff and has proved very useful in forging links with key personnel in oncology and haematology services.
- One of our key objectives for 2016 was to develop our children's support service. During the year, Dr Mairead Brennan was appointed to this role and Mairead has focused on this service. In addition, Mairead and our two oncology nurses have trained in delivering CLIMB. This is an acronym for 'Childrens Lives include Moments of Bravery'. This is a six week group intervention with the specific aim of normalizing the experience of cancer in the family. It aims to give children the language around cancer, normalize feelings and encourage communication within the family.

- A psycho-education course was offered in April and May to young women with breast cancer. This was run in conjunction with staff of the Symptomatic Breast unit at UHG and has been developed to address some of the specific issues that arise for younger women, such as body image, sexuality, fertility, fatigue and relationships. Twelve women attended this course and an evaluation showed beneficial effects.
- The Brain Tumour support group has been run very successfully for many years by Ann Buckley. During 2016, this support group came under the umbrella of Cancer Care West and Ann now runs this service under our auspices. As part of this service, Ann sees people who are living with a brain tumour as well as facilitating a monthly support group. Approximately ten to twelve people a month are supported by Ann.
- We also set up a monthly book club for cancer patients. This is facilitated by Mary Ryan, one of our volunteers and is a novel way for cancer patients to get together and support each other.
- In October, Cancer Care West hosted an evening public talk and a day- long seminar by Professor Robert Rutledge, Radiation Oncologist and Associate Professor in the Faculty of Medicine at Dalhousie University, based in Halifax, Nova Scotia. In addition to his commitment specializing in breast, prostate, and paediatric cancers, he is also co-founder of the Healing and Cancer Foundation that freely offers educational videos, documentaries, and web-casting seminars. Approximately 60 people attended these events. Dr Rutledge's seminar and talk was received with much acclaim.

- In October 2016, The International
 Psycho-Oncology Society held its annual
 academy and conference in Dublin.
 Cancer Care West staff presented a
 workshop on 'Living with Dying myths,
 Challenges and Realities'. This was
 attended by over 80 participants. Staff
 also attended the three day conference
 and heard many presentations on various
 aspects of cancer care. We also had a
 poster presentation which detailed the
 development of the community Psycho Oncology service at Cancer Care West
 during the years 2011–2015.
- The European Oncology Nursing Society was also held in Dublin this year. Our oncology nurses attended this over 2 days.

Schools & Colleges Education Programme

Members of the fundraising team visited primary and post primary schools and third level colleges throughout the west of Ireland to talk to students about the services provided by Cancer Care West.



THE CANCER CARE WEST Hardiman Scholarships were established under the auspices of the NUI Galway Hardiman programme to support translational and clinical research in the area of Cancer Biology and Therapeutics at NUI Galway and University Hospital Galway. One of the ten PhD scholarships is also being funded by the Maura Burke Memorial Fund.

Cancer Care West Hardiman Scholarships have been awarded for research projects in the areas of Medial Oncology, Psycho Oncology and Haematological Oncology.


